Political Science 416 Seminar on Liberalism and American Foreign Policy Spring 2011 Instructor: John Mearsheimer

Course Description: The course examines how America's liberal tradition affects its foreign policy.

<u>Course Requirements</u>: Every student is expected to do all the reading, attend all the seminars, and participate in the discussion. The grade will be based on classroom participation (25%) and one 15-page paper (75%).

A list of paper topics will be provided, from which students choose one. Papers are due in my office (Pick 416A) no later than 5:00 pm on Wednesday, June 8. Late papers will be dropped one letter grade for each day past the due date. The paper must be: no longer than 15 pages of text, double-spaced, have at least 1-inch margins on all four sides, and have a standard-sized font.
